Artist José Luis Torres, a master of structure-sculpture, has reinvented the space. The MNBAQ is especially proud to present this new work imagined by the Argentine-born artist, who has lived in Québec since 2003 and is truly a specialist of *in situ* sculptural installations. From November 30, 2017 to October 14, 2018, visitors young and old alike can enjoy *D'entrée de jeu* in the MNBAQ's central pavilion and forget grey, cold winter days by taking advantage of this stimulating environment.

If we only had three words to define Torres' creations, colour, humour and interaction immediately come to mind. The *D'entrée de jeu* exhibition will surprise visitors with its explosion of bright, attractive colours and its iconoclastic use of recycled materials will make them smile. An interactive experience based on a stroll through the very heart of the creation will allow visitors to see, touch, experience and reinvent.

Recycled objects serve art

Aside from imagining a stimulating, lively, vibrant space, José Luis Torres seeks to express diversity through his creations. Moreover, the materials that the artist uses, collected here and their over time, are truly multiform. From his Ali Baba's cave, he has drawn nearly 100 everyday recycled objects to enliven the space. Kayaks, wheelbarrows, buoys, bins, sprinklers, cones and doors, to name but a few, will be a source of discovery and wonder. However, they also propose a second focus and spur visitors to question our relationship to objects and, indeed, how we consume them.

The immersive exhibition with a multitude of coloured accents enables children to observe, create, perform and have fun. With its yellow, green and blue walls strewn with optical illusions to create imbalance and 3D effects, children and their parents can enjoy a unique ambiance that has everything to please, stimulate and delight.



D'entrée de jeu, comprises three stages

An archipelago of shapes

Five wheeled modules like a giant jigsaw puzzle with infinite possibilities are available to participants. Painted orange, all of the components that make up the modules sometimes form and archipelago of shapes or sometimes an inspiring creative worksite. Handling and creation are the keywords to broach this section of the Family Gallery.

The fugue, colourful objects fall

Brilliant, surprising sculptures made from multiform, multicoloured recycled objects, de Torres' works in the public space truly stand out. *D'entrée de jeu* proposes *The fugue*, a magnificent assemblage of odds and ends, as a cascade of objects in balance that even overflows outside the Family Gallery. The exhibition has everything to impress, amuse and touch visitors, offer them escape and make them reflect.


The reinvented cabin

In another area of the exhibition, children can cross several bridges that take them to a dream cabin with soft cushions and captivating books. They can observe and multiply perspectives, including that overlooking the work in the heart of the Pellan Garden, and, lastly, invent treasure hunts or secret places in the reinvented cabin. Several recycled doors in elegant colours and other everyday objects make up this playful, stimulating space.

José Luis Torres in a nutshell

José Luis Torres was born in Argentina. He holds a bachelor's degree in visual arts, a master's degree in sculpture and has training in architecture and the integration of the arts into architecture. He has lived and worked in Québec since 2003.



In his work, he seeks to stimulate the relationship that is established between the host facility, the work and the individual who interacts with it. His practice, which focuses above all on sculpture, is essentially motivated by diversions of meanings and simple gestures centred on modest objects and materials drawn from our familiar environments.

In most instances, his work is elaborated while he is moving about and travelling, not in his workshop, which he perceives instead as a container in which is concentrated the entire array of things that he collects.

Installation strategies figure prominently in his creative process. The spontaneous, incomplete, open configuration of his creations in the form of *in situ* installations and ephemeral initiatives frequently allude to architecture. Through his constructions, interdisciplinarity is apparent in the combination of sculptural notions and architectural concepts.

The spectator is invited to look, explore and physically experience the work since it is on a human scale. The purpose of his viral, invasive constructions is not form but the action of giving shape to a use or a situation. The dialogue, established between the site and the work, directly influences the configuration of his constructions, sometimes without a drawing or a plan, the choice of materials and their proportion.
