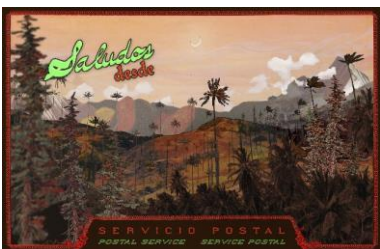


Identity is the unrelenting pursuit of contemporary artists

The MNBAQ Contemporary Art Award 2025

February 13 to April 21, 2025

In February, a significant group exhibition will showcase the recent works of the winning artists of the 2025 Prix en art actuel du MNBAQ. The award is the only honour focusing on present-day art in Canada that combines an exhibition, a publication, and an acquisition. It celebrates the effervescence of the contemporary Québec art scene.



The MNBAQ and the Fondation du Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec along with their valued financial partner the RBC Foundation since 2015, is proposing to explore the striking universes of **Anne-Marie Proulx**, **Michelle Lacombe**, **Rémi Belliveau**, **Eruoma Awashish**, and **Santiago Tamayo Soler**. The themes of territory, culture, migration, and identity are central to their artistic approaches. The diversity of the

approaches and career paths of the artists, who have between 10 and 20 years of practice, are surprising. Their artistic practices, ranging from installations to video and photography also include painting, body art, and music. To discover the essence of the avant-garde in current art in Québec, be sure to discover these five key artists.

An intensely free artist

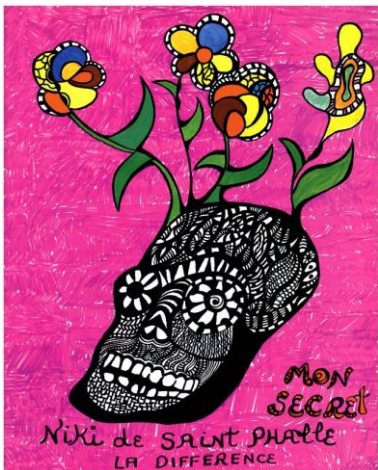
Niki de Saint Phalle. The 1980s and 1990s: Art Unleashed

June 12, 2025, to January 4, 2026



On June 12, 2025, the international exhibition *Niki de Saint Phalle. The 1980s and 1990s: Art Unleashed* will afford visitors a fascinating glimpse of the varied, inventive, committed universe of Niki de Saint Phalle (1930-2002), a French-American artist who enjoyed an exciting career.

This is the first monographic exhibition devoted to Niki de Saint Phalle presented in a Canadian museum. It has been produced in collaboration with Les Abattoirs, Musée – Frac Occitanie Toulouse, and the generous participation of the Niki Charitable Art Foundation. The exhibition focuses on the last two decades of the artist’s life, starting in 1978 when she launched the monumental *Tarot Garden* project in Italy, a site devoted to art and life, which opened to the public in 1998.



This diverse exhibition will assemble over 150 works that Niki de Saint Phalle produced in the 1980s and 1990s. An innovative, exemplary entrepreneurial model that the artist established facilitated this prosperous period characterized by great artistic freedom and commitments to social issues, thus ensuring her financial and creative independence. It is indeed a privilege to welcome her works to Québec City.

Next spring will witness the spectacular arrival of the *Angel of Temperance*, a sculpture that Niki de Saint Phalle produced in 1998. This *Nana* with gold wings that is over 5 m high will be installed in the Grand Hall of the Pierre Lassonde Pavilion and will set the tone for this

amazing international exhibition devoted to an artist who always sought to make the world a magical place again through art.

Virtuosity and fascination

Hyperrealism: This is Not a Body

February 26 to October 12, 2026



In the winter of 2026, the *Hyperrealism: This is Not a Body* exhibition will showcase astonishing sculptures in the exhibition rooms of the Pierre Lassonde Pavilion. After Australia, the Netherlands, Spain, and France, Québec City in Canada, the first destination in North America, will display the fascinating, imposing, masterly works of 25 artists representing the best of hyperrealistic sculpture at the international level. The works are veritable mirrors of human experience that explore identities, emotions, and societal challenges revealing changes in our image from the 1970s to the 2020s.



The Institut für Kulturaustausch de Tübingen in Germany has organized the exhibition, produced under the scientific direction of Dr. Otto Letze, the author of several works devoted to photorealism, hyperrealism, and pop art.

Works by like-minded Québec artists will be added to the strikingly realistic sculptures by Duane Hanson, George Segal, Ron Mueck, Patricia Piccinini, and Maurizio Cattelan, among others, which will certainly confront visitors with their own humanity.

Outstanding cultural seasons

The coming months will be no exception and the MNBAQ will offer more cultural activities that will surprise visitors.

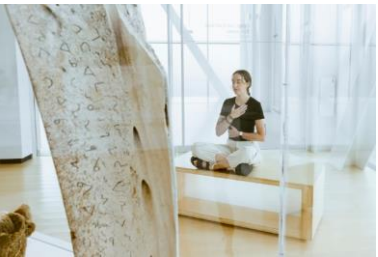
Spotlight on artist Marie-Anne Loir



To get the year off to a good start, a special program focusing on *Gaspard-Joseph Chaussegros de Léry, fils (1761-1762)*, a new acquisition at the MNBAQ, will cause a sensation. In the wake of recent research on Marie-Anne Loir (1705-1783), a portrait painter in New France, she has finally won acclaim and is being fully recognized for a series of works produced in the 18th century.

This week of festivities, part of the annual *A Celebrated Work* series to be held from **January 28 to February 2, 2025**, will enable visitors to discover a Québec artist, participate in creation workshops (*Sketch a Model* and *Classical Portrait*), attend a lecture by Daniel Drouin, Curator of Early Art at the MNBAQ, or see the magnificent film *Portrait de la jeune fille en feu*.

Some unmissable events



Inspired by the *Early Days. Indigenous Art from the McMichael Canadian Art Collection*, visitors can participate in a wide array of activities at the beginning of the year, including Innu artist Raphaëlle Langevin's introductory beadweaving workshop, a series of three lectures organized in collaboration with the Ashukan Institute that highlight oral traditions, mythology, and the challenges that cohabitation pose, Indigenous cultural dance workshops, and a 5@9 du MNBAQ produced with the team from the *KWE!* festival. Even the 2025 spring break at the MNBAQ will afford visitors an opportunity to meet Indigenous artists.



Among the new features starting in January, morning museum-yoga sessions will enable those who wish to combine art with their preferred discipline to take advantage of sessions in a soothing setting. On **April 9, 2025**, a festive literary talk featuring author Marc Séguin and art historian Laurier Lacroix will focus on *Madeleine et moi*, in large part inspired by a work from the MNBAQ's collections. From **February 3 to 6, 2025**, an open residency with the Compagnie de danse K par K in conjunction with its 20th anniversary will enable visitors to observe the creative process in the MNBAQ's public spaces.



In the spring, a colourful new edition of the Festival International du Film sur l'Art (FIFA) will run from **March 14 to 23, 2025**. *Slow Art Day* will be celebrated on **April 5, 2025** with MNBAQ guides, who will familiarize

visitors with a sensitive approach to the works in the *Us* exhibition. Artists devoted to comics, the 9th art, will charm visitors on **April 12 and 13** during **Québec BD**. The year 2025 promises to be stimulating indeed.

The Riopelle Space* is an ambitious construction site that is advancing rapidly



Since the Riopelle Space* construction site was launched last spring, an impressive amount of work has been carried out. The deconstruction of the Central Pavilion has been completed and the foundations of the new building are about to be finalized. In 2025, MNBAQ visitors will have a front-row seat to observe the ongoing project. They will witness the emergence of the impressive steel framework of the building dedicated to the work of Jean Paul Riopelle and his contemporaries.

As the pavilion's construction proceeds in the coming weeks, works from art-loving patrons of the Jean Paul Riopelle Foundation will continue to arrive at the MNBAQ. The MNBAQ team will prepare them and plan future exhibitions that will highlight the artistic approach and multiplicity of this renowned artist. Moreover, an innovative approach is being developed for the circular presentation of Riopelle's masterpiece, *Homage to Rosa Luxemburg*, the jewel of the MNBAQ's collections.

Committees will also plan the reception and development of public spaces and the design of the visible reserve, another facet of the future building of interest to the public.

The winning artist of the national public art competition and the concept of the exterior work to be integrated into the building will be announced in the spring of 2025.

Every effort is being made to ensure that the opening of the Riopelle Space*, planned in the fall of 2026, celebrates the first stage in the major transformation of the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec.

The major fundraising campaign of the Fondation du MNBAQ, *+D'art dans nos vies*, is continuing to make up the financing of the new pavilion and ensure the continuity of all the MNBAQ's activities.
